Political

The absence of a solution to the political deadlock and continuing legitimacy crisis over the GNU's mandate continue to define the context of heightened political uncertainty. In the current context, there are two political initiatives at odds with one another. The pro Al-Meshri bloc within the High Council of State (HCS) recently voted in favour of the House of Representatives' (HoR) 13TH constitutional amendment, while key international actors have announced support for the political initiative proposed by UN SRSG Abdoulaye Bathily.

Intense political manoeuvring will likely define the next few weeks against the backdrop of Bathily's proposed formation of a High-level Steering Panel for Libya. Key contentious issues such as the eligibility of dual nationals and military officials to run for president will continue to divide Libyan stakeholders and undermine progress towards a solution to the stalemate.

The UN SRSG's proposal is already facing resistance from key domestic actors such as the HoR. Consequently, Whispering Bell assesses actors opposed to the UN-led initiative will double down on their campaigns to form a new unified government as a hedge against the UN push to establish a new dialogue forum. In turn, renewed efforts to form a new government will mount the pressure on the GNU and PM Abdul Hamid Dbeibah. Amid US pressure to hold elections, Dbeibah may be compelled to reshuffle his cabinet and/or organise limited legislative elections. Of note, Dbeibah announced the formation of a government committee to implement and coordinate elections on 09 March, while Bathily provided further details on his proposal to form a High-Level Steering Panel for Libya in a press briefing on 11 March.

Security

Tripoli is operational and continues to present a relatively permissive operational environment. Sporadic incidents will continue to define security atmospherics in the western region. From a security standpoint, the status quo and stable atmospherics are set to remain as is in Tripoli. Lowimpact and localised flashpoints outside government offices are possible but are unlikely to escalate or impact business operations. Targeted attacks against HoR MPs, HCS members, and other political figures are likely as political tensions peak over the next few weeks.

Oil & Gas

Disruptions to production are likely despite evidence the LNA is yet to support a coordinated oil blockade. In his latest visit to Libya, US Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Director William Burns allegedly reiterated to Haftar the importance of safeguarding oil and gas facilities and production.

TRIPOLI

Report nº6276: Al-Dahra: Main road closed due to roadworks

WB sources reported Al-Dahra main road from <u>Shafko Roundabout</u> until <u>Al-Dahra Busses Station Roundabout</u> is closed due to roadworks in the evening on 25 April. The roadworks carried out by Tripoli's Security Directorate and the General Services Company, aims to expand the main road in order to reduce traffic congestion in Tripoli's downtown area. The duration of the roadworks remains unknown.

NATIONWIDE / GENERAL

Sabratah Municipal Council attacked

Reports indicate unidentified assailants opened fire on Sabratah Municipal Council <u>HQ</u> in the evening on 25 April. Unconfirmed reports allege the attackers are supporters of Libya's former Mufti Sadiq Al-Ghiryani. Additional unconfirmed reports allege the <u>Awqaf and Islamic Affairs -</u> <u>Sabratha office</u> will be targeted next.

Comment: The alleged involvement of AI-Ghiryani supporters increases the prospects of similar politically-motivated incidents across the west in the short-term amid controversy over AI-Ghiryani's fatwa with regard to the commencement of Eid AI-Fitr, causing a split between those who supported the declaration and those considering it a religious offense.

• 01 May: ATC strike threat

The Air Traffic Control (ATC) Union threatened to enter a strike and suspend air traffic control services across all Libyan airports as of 01 May, if their demands to be included in the unified salary scale as well as the provision of navigational devices are unmet.

FSA tightens grip on foreign security companies

The Facilities Security Authority (FSA) issued a statement at night on 25 April urging foreign security and safety companies operating across Libya to register and obtain special permits to carry out their activity in-country. The FSA added that companies failing to abide will be prosecuted.

Comment: Of note, the FSA has targeted a global security company for allegedly operating without necessary paperwork in Libya, and visited the offices of some of its clients over the past two weeks.

Al-Zawiya/Tarhunah: Alleged military gatherings

Unconfirmed reports allege a military gathering affiliated with AI-Selaa militia was monitored in the <u>Beer Terfas</u> area in the southern suburbs of AI-Zawiya in the afternoon on 25 April. Later that evening, unconfirmed reports a military gathering affiliated with the 444 Fighting Brigade was monitored in Tarhunah's <u>Fam Molga</u> area in the evening on 25 April in preparation to mobilise towards <u>AI-Zawiya</u> to secure the city at the orders of GNU Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Dbeibah. The Brigade's commander, Mahmoud Hamza, allegedly refused to carry out Dbeibah's orders. The brigade has not issued a statement in this regard thus far.

• Al-Zawiya: Buzreiba-Al-Beidja dispute

Reports indicate a dispute erupted between Stabilisation Support Agency (SSA) deputy commander Hassan Buzreiba and former Libyan Coast Guard commander Abdulrahman al-Milad aka "Al-Beidja" due to the former's arrest of Al-Beidja's brother in Al-Zawiya. The arrest was sparked by a disagreement over the cost to smuggle irregular migrants, according to reports.

Gaddafi political team: Saif in contact with all countries

The political team of former Libyan leader's son Saif AI-Islam Gaddafi issued a statement on 25 April noting Gaddafi's communication with all countries regarding his electoral campaign, and not just Russia. The statement welcomed dealing and communicating with all countries, including the US and UK, as long as they adhere to non-interference in Libya's domestic affairs. Meanwhile, the statement denied allegations that a foreign country is financing Gaddafi's campaign and described the rumours as "propaganda" by opponents hoping to tarnish Saif's image. The statement noted that while Gaddafi's movements are carefully calculated, this did not prevent him from holding meetings with various parties in Libya.

Comment: It is common for Gaddafi's political team to issue statements on Gaddafi's political efforts following prolonged periods of silence from Gaddafi himself and no confirmed information on his current whereabouts. Such statements do not hold significant political weight on the ground, and instead seek to ensure Gaddafi remains relevant in the current political context.
