Political

Whispering Bell continues to assess presidential elections are unlikely in 2023, despite momentum towards the polls. In the current context, Libya stands at the political crossroads of new government announcements. Political outcomes rest on the House of Representatives (HoR) and High Council of State's (HCS) adoption of the political roadmap and electoral laws produced by the 6+6 committee, which stipulate presidential elections must be held within 8 months of the ratification of the electoral laws.

However, the HoR fell short of ratifying the electoral laws produced by the 6+6 committee during its session on 10 July after an altercation between MPs. The dispute was allegedly sparked by MPs closely aligned with Haftar. Against the backdrop of tensions within the HoR, HCS members proposed ratifying the electoral laws produced by the 6+6 committee and sending them directly to the High National Election Commission (HNEC) to move ahead with presidential and parliamentary elections. For its part, the HCS adopted the roadmap for the implementation of the electoral laws in its session on 11 July, albeit with some technical observations. Still, the ball remains in the HoR's court to ratify the laws. Instead, the HoR appears to be laying the groundwork for another roadmap that aims to form a new government.

On 10 July, HoR Speaker Aguila Saleh presented to his deputies a mechanism to form a new limited government tasked with overseeing the transitional period until elections are held. According to the proposal, the process of forming a new government begins with opening the door for the candidacy for the post of Prime Minister for a period of 15 days from the date the roadmap is approved. The winning candidate is required to obtain 15 recommendations from the HoR and 12 recommendations from the HCS and the government is considered to have gained confidence once the Prime Minister obtains the required votes. The newly-elected Prime Minister must then present his cabinet and government programme to the HoR within 20 days from the date of his assignment.

Given the stalemate, the UN Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL) will reportedly convene key Libyan stakeholders over the next few days to reach a settlement on the electoral laws.

Security

Stable atmospherics prevail across the country. An uptick in tensions was recorded along the coastal road westwards from Al-Zawiya to Ras Ajdir. Travellers are advised to exercise caution.

Oil & Gas

The threat of an LNA-induced oil blockade has significantly increased across all scenarios and is now assessed a likely in the next three months. Against the backdrop of mounting political tension, backchannel negotiations to form a new government, and diplomatic pressure, the LNA may be compelled to utilize the "oil card" to raise its bargaining leverage in the medium term (3-6 months). The LNA is unlikely to directly sanction a blockade but may instead do so by exploiting local grievances to restrict oil exports and exert pressure on the GNU.

Report nº6504: HCS initial acceptance of roadmap based on 6+6 electoral laws

The High Council of State (HCS) announced its initial acceptance of a roadmap based on the electoral laws prepared by the 6+6 Joint Committee, pending a few amendments based on technical observations during their 88th session held on 11 July.

Analysis/Comment: The development comes as the House of Representatives (HoR) failed to hold a session on 11 July to discuss the Committee's proposal regarding the electoral laws. It will be recalled that both chambers previously stressed the need for amendments to be made to the electoral laws concluded in the Bouznika-hosted talks held in early June. Meanwhile, the UN Support Mission in Libya (UNSMIL) recently stressed that the electoral laws in their current cannot be implemented in a manner that promises successful elections.

Report nº6505: MJI: Former GNA Minister arrested

Reports indicate the Internal Security Agency (ISA) arrested former GNA Finance Minister Faraj Boumatri upon arriving at Tripoli's Mitiga International Airport (MJI) at night on 11 July. Reports suggest the Special Deterrence Force (SDF) prevented the ISA from escorting Boumatri out of the airport, demanding them to disclose the motive behind his arrest or release him. There are conflicting reports over who ordered the arrest. Some reports suggest the arrest was ordered by Central Bank of Libya (CBL) Governor Al-Siddik Al-Kabir after rumours of his replacement by Boumatri, while other reports suggest the arrest was ordered by GNU Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Dbeibah. Of note, Boumatri hails from the eastern region.

• Report n°6506: ACA HQ: Misrata components denounce 111 BDE-sanctioned raid

Residents, notables, and wisemen from Misrata issued a statement on 11 July denouncing the raid on the Administrative Control Authority (ACA) <u>HQ</u> in Tripoli by the 111 Brigade on 10 July. Of note, the Brigade's commander, Abdulsalam Al-Zoubi, and the recently dismissed former ACA Head Sulaimen Al-Shanti, both hail from Misrata. The statement suggests that the Misrata components are surprised over the fact that Al-Zoubi permitted Al-Shanti's replacement despite the two individuals hailing from the same city.

Meanwhile, sources denied that the ACA was raided and reported that Al-Shanti's successor, Abdulah Qaderbouh, faced no resistance when entering the ACA HQ and assuming his duties. Sources reported Qaderbouh entered the HQ escorted by several unidentified armed forces.

Report nº6507: Trabelsi defends decision to restructure WM directorates

GNU Interior Minister Emad Trabelsi reaffirmed that his decision to restructure the security directorates in the western mountain region came after the formation of a specialised technical committee that worked for three months to draft the reoganisation plan during a speech marking the handobrt over vehicles to security directorates in the western mountain region on 11 July. Trabelsi defended his decision, which prompted mayors from the western mountain to rupture ties with the GNU, stressing that security directorates are organisational institutions whose work lies in organisation procedures and is not linked to geographical borders. Trabelsi stated that the next phase of his ministry's plan will include the reoganisation of the west coast security directorates followed by directorates across all of Libya's regions, noting that the ministry is in constant contact with the GNU Prime Minister and the Attorney General about its decisions related to the reoganisation of security directorates. It will be recalled that GNU Prime Minister Abdul Hamid Dbeibah recently froze a decision sanctioned by Trabelsi to reoganise the western mountain security directorates after the mayors from the western mountain region ruptured ties with the GNU in protest of the decision.

Analysis/Comment: Trabelsi's apparent persistence to press ahead with the implementation of the decision in neglect of Dbeibah's orders and the local response on the ground, could fuel tensions between Trabelsi and Dbeibah in the short-term.

Benghazi: HoR session postponed

House of Representatives (HoR) Spokesman Aguila Saleh announced the postponement of the HoR session scheduled for 11 July until 25 July in order to hold further deliberations on the items on the parliament's agenda. Meanwhile, reports allege a pro-LNA bloc within parliament led by Second Deputy Speaker Musbah Douma prevented HoR Speaker Aguila Saleh from holding the 11 July session. While the HoR failed to hold the 11 July session that was due to discuss the electoral laws prepared by the 6+6 Joint Committee, the HCS announced its initial approval of a roadmap based on the 6+6's electoral laws in its regular session held in Tripoli.

Al-Zawiya: IED attached to telecom. tower dismantled

Reports indicate an improvised explosive device (IED) was found attached to a telecommunications tower in Al-Zawiya's <u>Beir Terfas</u> area in the morning on 11 July. The IED was found by a technical team affiliated with a local telecommunications company while carrying out maintenance works on the tower. The technical team informed the 103 Battalion "Al-Selaa" (Al-Zawiya) and the Military Engineering Department on the presence of the IED. The Battalion and Department arrived at the scene and dismantled the IED. While there are no further details available, unconfirmed reports allege the IED was placed with the aim of blowing up the telecommunications tower in protest of the drone antennas installed on top of the tower. It will be recalled that the GNU carried out a security operation against criminals and smugglers across the west coast region throughout June, which included a series of unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) strikes on various locations across Al-Zawiya.

Al-Zawiya: Murder

A local man was shot dead in Al-Zawiya's <u>Al-Mutrud</u> area at night on 11 July, according to reports. Unconfirmed reports allege the victim was accidentally shot by his friend.

Sabha: Missing man found murdered

Reports indicate the body of a local elderly man who was reported missing over the past 72hrs was found hand-cuffed, bearing signs of torture and a headshot in Sabha's <u>Al-Manshya</u> area in the evening on 11 July. The victim hailed from the Gdadfa tribe, according to reports. There are no further details available. Of note, the incident follows an evident decrease in criminal activity reported in the south, including Sabha, over recent months.

Benghazi: Haftar receives Bathily

LNA commander Khalifa Haftar received UN SRSG Abdoulaye Bathily at his office in Benghazi on 11 July. The two sides agreed on the importance of addressing the contentious issues in the electoral laws prepared by the 6+6 Joint Committee, as well the importance of the buy-in from all national institutions and key stakeholders to reach a political settlement for successful elections.

Ras Ajdir: Zuwara accuses Mol of misinformation on death at BCP

The GNU Ministry of Interior (MoI) issued a statement dated on 10 July expressing its regret over the passing of an elderly local woman at the at Libyan-Tunisian Ras Ajdir border crossing point (BCP) who died while waiting in a long queue to enter Tunisia for medical treatment. The Ministry stressed the need to restructure the security forces at the BCP by assigning trained and professional forces to control the traffic movement.

In rejection of the GNU's statement, the Greater Municipality of Zuwara accused the Interior Ministry of distorting facts in a. statement issued on the same day.

Of note, recent reports points to several issues at the Ras Ajdir BCP, including passport system glitches on the Libyan side and claims of Tunisian authorities bringing in large numbers of Sub-Saharan African migrants into Libya via the border.
